Academic Master Plan

<u>Lori Montalbano</u>

Thanks for the opportunity to talk to you regarding the master plan which has been in process since October 2018. We brought representatives across campus together to talk about what we wanted this plan to look like and what kinds of information is needed internally and externally.

- Timeline is 1-3 years
- This is a 'living' document which means we will look at it annually or bi-annually to check progress in areas we have indicated
- A draft of the plan will be available on our website on Friday (Nov. 15)
- Open meetings will follow for discussion
- Goal is to start implementation in the new fiscal year (7.1.2020)
- Establishment of an evaluation calendar
- The sub-committee is focused on different types of information gathering
- The future program planning and assessment subcommittee is focused on programmatic trends
 - What kind of ways do we see higher education evolving over the next 10 years
- The community and local needs assessment subcommittee job trends locally and nationally

- The situational analysis and research committee needs of our students in particular, demographic trends; how do we plan to make our programming stays relevant
- 89% of our undergraduates come from the regions we serve
- A substantial decrease ('cliff') of about 10% in 2030 is expected for high school students; in our region it is expected at only 3%;
- In conversation with CEC and the EcO Attainment Network, we have planned attainment strategies in education
 - o 37.6% of adults in Region 9 hold a degree, certificate, or industry certification
 - o 9% of our population has less than a high school diploma
 - o 60% of jobs will need post H.S. credentials in the near future
 - New degree programs will be assessed based on the needs of the region and growing trends
- National Survey of Student Engagement
 - Our students don't engage with diversity as much as we would like at this time
 - Students have to work at least 20 hours/week
- Communities in which we serve have 4 industries that are projected to have job growth
 - o Healthcare / with retirement of baby boomers
 - o Education / teacher shortage
 - o Manufacturing / demands remain strong
 - o Technology and software / demands remain strong
- Hot jobs of the future that support manufacturing
 - Accountants
 - Mechanical engineers
 - Computer systems analyst
 - Software developer
 - o CIS manager
 - Network administrator
- Future planning and assessment committee
