
"If It Bleeds, We Can Kill It": Conservative Responses to Gender Through Predator

Methodology: Ideological criticism—a rhetorical analysis of the beliefs, values, and assumptions embedded within *Predator*. **Thesis:** *Predator*'s adversarial attitude towards feminist progress foreshadowed the rhetoric of Trump and the Alt-Right.

Findings: Predator

Conservation of gendered dichotomies through physical space.

- The jungle is personified as feminine (Srceva-Pavlovska, 2014).
- The predator is uniquely suited to use the jungle due to invisibility and knowledge of terrain.

Conservation of hegemonic masculinity

- The main characters use homophobic and sexist language throughout the film.
- The female character, Anna, is forced into a subservient role.
- Bleeding (menstruation) is used to diminish the power of the predator.

Conservation of unequal gendered roles

- Anna is kept unarmed and dependent on the male characters.
- The predator illustrates feminine independence and is killed.

Findings: Trump and the Alt-Right

Conservation of gendered dichotomies through physical space.

- The Alt-Right refer to themselves as the "nemesis of left-wing feminism" who operate in a "manosphere" online (Bokhari & Yiannopoulos, 2016, para. 14).
- Gender separation is enforced on social media (Dawson, 2016; Brown, 2016)

Conservation of hegemonic masculinity

- Trump's leaked "Locker Room Talk" with Billy Bush.
- Trump's use of menstruation to delegitimize Megyn Kelly.

Conservation of unequal gendered roles

- Trump institutes Miss USA "purity rule" (Valenti, 2009)
- Trump stated ideal woman is a homemaker who is compliant to a man's schedule (Foran, 2016)
